2020-05-26 Call with Premier John Horgan, Dr. Bonnie Henry and Health Minister Adrian Dix

- 1. John Horgan began with a lament of all the acts of racism during this time and thanked the faith communities for being a voice of anti-racism and anti-hate.
- 2. We must continue to have gatherings with no more that 50 people present and continue to be physically distanced.

50 is not a scientific number, but it has been established for two reasons:

- 1. to limit the spread if someone who is infected participates in the gathering, and
- 2. to limit the number of people to be tracked when that becomes necessary.
- 3. If we are meeting publicly, be sure to clean the area, especially the high touch surfaces, before the next new people come into that area.
- 4. There is concern for the fall when flu season starts up again.
 - 1. The current guidelines are expected to remain in place through this season.
- 5. Testing, tracing, and tracking will take place when the virus is spread in a public gathering (hopefully to be able to be done within 24 hours).
 - 1. This is to prevent explosive spreading.
- 6. A church in Frankfurt, Germany recently met, with 150 people in attendance.
 - 1. There was a spread of COVID-19; 107 people tested positive, and there were some deaths.
- 7. Here are responses to Questions that were asked:
 - 1. My two questions from our pastors:
 - 1. Ask about particular guidelines for summer day camps.
 - 1. Dr. Henry said that the BC Centre for Disease Control, http://covid-19.bccdc.ca/, is working on this, and a guideline will be coming soon.
 - 2. Ask for more clarity on congregational singing.
 - 1. Dr. Henry simply pointed to two stories of explosive spreading of the virus that involved singing:
 - 2. In the Frankfurt spread of the virus in a church gathering mentioned above, singing was the biggest problem.
 - 3. In the Seattle choir incident of the spread of COVID-19: of 60 choir members, there were 45 who were diagnosed with COVID-19 or were ill with symptoms, and 2 deaths.
 - 4. She said that singing is best done virtually, not while gathered.
 - 5. See additional note at the end of this report (not from Dr. Henry).
 - 3. Microphones are not a high-risk concern, just cleaning your hands with soap and water for 20 seconds or with alcohol-based hand sanitizer.

- 4. It is really important to track any people who come together and all their contacts.
 - tracking for 14 days
- 5. What about eating together?
 - Definitely no buffets
 - Contact your health officer for guidelines

For any food that is prepared in a public kitchen:

- physical distancing for kitchen workers,
- food preparation according to guidelines,
- only individually plated meals, where no utensils are exchanged between workers
- 6. Charitable giving John Horgan will be giving attention to encouraging people to generously support charitable organisations in the next couple of weeks.
- 7. There will be government funding for anti-racism and anti-hate initiatives.
 - There is acknowledgement of the fear that is behind this, and work will be done to address this fear.
- 8. Meeting in homes
 - Meeting in small groups in homes with the same consistent 2 or 3 families being together is okay.
 - It is a must to make sure that all other connections beyond this gathered group are limited and traceable.
 - The reality is that children don't understand social distancing well.
 - 1. Dr. Henry said that we must keep our germs to ourselves, so, keeping the kids from touching each other will probably be the best that can be done.
- 9. Church washrooms can be used, with these guidelines:
 - limiting people, one person at a time (depending on the size of the washroom maybe 2 at a time)
 - cleaning the high touch areas on a regular basis
- 10. There was a question about someone coming to an appropriately gathered event from outside the province.
 - Dr. Henry said that BC has no restrictions on inter-provincial travel.

- 11. Can two gatherings of no more than 50 people happen in two different areas of the same building?
 - o Dr. Henry said, "Yes," but the two groups must have no interaction.
 - They must enter and leave through separate doors, and not interact outside the building.
 - Again, the reason for the separation and retaining the size of any single group is:
 - to limit the spread if someone who is infected participates in the gathering, and
 - to limit the number of people to be tracked when a spread of the virus occurs.
